


Service Delivery 2023 Highlights

Clients Served About **2.5 million** women of reproductive age reached with sexual and reproductive health information and services in Kenya.



Contraceptives by Continuing Users

- **45**% **of 699,542** clients preferred male condoms as a contraceptive method
- Implants (3 months), injectables (3 and 5 years) and emergency pills (POP) were the most continued at 11.2%, 11.1% and 9.5% respectively; while oral contraceptives (combined) was the least continued at 6.8% by women






of SRH services were offered through network health facilities (214 facilities reporting)

SRH Information and Services

- 84% of 2.5 million clients accessing SRH information and services were from peri-urban and rural areas
- **34% of 1,387,768** women accessing family planning were young women (0-24 years)



Contraceptives by First-time Users

- **58.2% of 154,445** first-time users were young women (0-24 years)
- The most preferred method by young women (0-24 years) were injectables at 44%, oral contraceptives at 22.9%, IUD at 17.5% and implants at 15.6%


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Service Delivery 2023 Highlights

Non-contraceptive services

1,190,407 clients served with non-contraceptive SRH services such as **HIV**, **STI**, **safe abortion and obstetric services**




Safe Abortion Services

 60% of 404,111 women who sought safe abortion information and services were young women (0-24 years)

HIV and STI Services

- 87% of 344,620 HIV and STI clients received services through network facilities, 6.9% from static clinic and 5.2% through outreaches
- 69% of HIV and STI clients served were aged 0-24 years





Obstetrics Services

• **71.2** % of clients receiving obstetric services were aged 0-24 years



of network health facilities offering SRH services were located in rural and peri-urban settings



of all clients receiving SRH services were poor and vulnerable

Policies & Guidelines

- Supported the development of the Guidelines on Self-care in Reproductive Health
- Supported the development of the Training Manual for Healthcare Providers on Self-care in Reproductive Health
- Supported the development of the Clinical Handbook on Prevention and Management of the Big 5 Direct Causes of Maternal Morbidity and Mortality in Kenya
- Supported the development of the National Guidelines on Mifepristone and Misoprostol Combination (CombiPack Handbook)



Convening

- Supported the Ministry of Health to constitute the Self-Care Core Group (SCCG) steer the implementation of approved self-care guidelines
- Supported coalition building of SRHR actors in Kenya that led to the revamped Sexual and Reproductive Health Coalition (SRHC)
- In partnership with the Ministry of Health, convened the 6th Scientific Conference on Adolescent and Youth Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights themed 'Localisation of Global AYSRHR Commitments' that brought together 550 delegates from 12 countries across the region



Documentation

- Documented self-care pilot activities in Bungoma
 County (A Qualitative Review of Initiatives by the
 Government and Implementing Partners July
 2022 to December 2023)
- Documented comprehensive sexuality education activities in Kakamega County (Taming Teen Pregnancies One Conversation at a Time)
- Over 30 articles on SRHR published on mainstream media written by youth and network members



Program Reach

- Reached 1,007,619 people through online SRH campaigns on various social media platforms
- Reached 17,521 young people (in and out of school) with comprehensive sexuality education
- Trained 40 network healthcare providers on SRHR service provision updates including legal framework and 37 youth peer providers on SRHR media and budget advocacy
- Reached 550 employees in 4 sugar companies through SRH outreaches
- Litigation advocacy saw the withdrawal of a court case filed at Makadara court against a network provider for providing abortion services to an adolescent.







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
